Community or Fellowship?

Two words that almost mean the same. Community a modern buzzword, fellowship a dated, old fashioned word. We call ourselves Bethel Christian Fellowship, but we are also a community of believers in Jesus Christ. To be a community means we have interests in common, to be a fellowship implies more: friendship, sharing, a common direction.

The ideal is the revolutionary principle of fellowship around a common cause, as Luke describes in Acts 2: They devoted themselves to the apostle's teaching and to the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. That in a nutshell describes the launching pad for all Christian communities. For us today, the reality often feels different. As the old rhyme puts it:

To dwell above with saints we love, that will be grace and glory. To live below with saints we know; now, that's another story!

Many might say that community is an 'impossible possibility'. Community is what we're created for and yet we never quite achieve it, at least not in this world. Community is something almost everyone longs for but everything we call "community" falls short of our hopes. Still, followers of Jesus find it is in our mental and spiritual DNA to hope for that loving, grace filled community of Christ.

We know that the original community is God himself. Or should I say "Themselves?" Father, Son and Holy Spirit—the perfect community in whose image we are created. Jesus prayed that the church would be a reflection of that divine community. In John 17 he asked the Father to make his disciples one as he and the Father are

one. But we know from church history how, for the most part, the church has failed miserably in that calling.

Even so, here and there throughout history, maybe in our own experience, real community has appeared. People have for a few brief hours, days, months or even years experienced the beauty of true community - in part, imperfectly, but truly and sweetly nevertheless. Real community is a gift, it isn't an achievement. That's why there's something paradoxical "intentional about the term community." We can intend community all day but we'll never have it just by intending it. We have to receive it. But that's not as easy as it sounds.

One of the most challenging writers on community is Dietrich Bonhoeffer- the German theologian killed in World War 2. He wrote these words-

"Christian community is like the Christian's sanctification. It is a gift of God which we cannot claim. Only God knows the real state of our fellowship, of our sanctification. What may appear weak and trifling to us may be great and glorious to God. Just as the Christian should not be constantly feeling his spiritual pulse, so, too, the Christian community has not been given to us by God for us to be constantly taking it's temperature. The more thankfully we daily receive what is given to us, the more surely and steadily will fellowship increase and grow from day to day as God pleases."

We love each other, because Jesus first loved us and gave his life for us. In response we must give ourselves, and forgive - recognising that we all stand equally sinful before the Father. In all we do we must make the love of Jesus our heart's desire and life's goal. In receiving Jesus, humbly and in unvarnished truth, we receive the seeds of true fellowship.

WHAT NEXT? What happened when you became a Christian?

If you've recently become a Christian, then you're at the very beginning of a new life with God. At first, you may have many questions, doubts and confusions; this is hardly surprising when you realise what's just happened to you. Don't worry, as you live your life the way God wants you to, these questions, doubts and confusions will be answered in His time. You're like a new-born child who needs to learn many things; you must also remember that you've lived life as you please up to now. There will, therefore, be many things which you need to unlearn as well.

Upon becoming a Christian, there are a number of life-changing things that have happened to you which you will need to know in order to grow and mature, and the following short Bible study will bring you up to date...

You are a child of God: John 1:12-13. You have eternal life and you will not be condemned, because you have crossed over from death to life: John 5:24. God will never leave you or forsake you: Hebrews 13:5. You have the power available to overcome the world: 1 John 5:4-5. You have received part of God Himself, the Holy Spirit: Ephesians 1:13-14.

Before you became a Christian, you were a two-part person, you had a body and soul (consisting of will, mind and emotions); upon becoming a Christian, you became a three-part person. You still have your body and soul, but your spirit, which once wasn't active, has now been made alive by the 4 Holy Spirit. So, instead of just relying

on yourself, and on what your five senses teach you, as you did before, you can now rely on God, who's dwelling within you in the form of the Holy Spirit.

The Bible is too full of God-given, helpful instructions to Christians for me to list them all here, but unless you put the following principles into action in your life, you won't grow and mature as a Christian:

- * A Christian is a disciple, or follower, of Jesus and from now on you should put the claims of Jesus first in your life regardless of the cost to yourself. When you gave your life to God, you made Him Lord of it, which means He's the boss, not you; you need to obey everything He asks you to do, but remember, God is love, He'll only ask you to do things which grow out of the love that He has for you and for other people.
- * The Bible is the God-inspired book which needs to be read and studied regularly by every Christian; it's God's handbook for successful Christian living.
- * All Christians need to pray to God, and prayer is simply talking with and listening to God. Regular prayer will enable your relationship with God to grow.
- * You cannot be a Christian on your own. Christians are like coals glowing in a fire; together we'll give warmth and light to each other, as well as to those outside the fire. If we don't get fellowship with other Christians, we'll begin to lose our fire, we'll begin to go cold. The best place to be with other Christians is in the local church where you'll find help and encouragement.
- * The Bible teaches us to tell others

about Jesus and all He's done for us, don't keep your Christianity to yourself; it's a matter of life and death to others just as it is to you.

- * Ask God to fill you with His Holy Spirit on a daily basis; you need the Holy Spirit to empower you and to enable you to serve God effectively.
- * Finally; it's no good only giving God the bit of your life that you want to give Him, God wants you to follow Him whole-heartedly. You need to continually keep your eyes on Him and not let yourself be distracted from following after Him. He's given your life meaning and purpose, you need to give your life totally over to Him, and obey Him, knowing that He's promised to be with you always.

My Husband, Normand

My husband, Normand, was admitted to Broomfield Hospital in July, and then to Madelayne Court Care Home in Chelmsford in August. He suffers from Alzheimer's disease and vascular dementia, and his needs became so acute that I could no longer cope with him at home.

The first real indication that something was wrong was when my G.P. called an ambulance after a routine visit. I knew I was unwell, but I was too scared to go to hospital. Whilst waiting for the ambulance I received a picture of Noah's Ark in the storm. It was in the ambulance I started to become fully aware that something was terribly wrong. My blood pressure was soaring, I felt like I was distant from everything going on. When I was alone in the ambulance for a few minutes (they had to pull over to wait for a third paramedic) I was really very scared. I thought to myself "Dear God, please don't let me die vet!" I begged God for more time to put straight a lot of situations in my life, to walk with Jesus more closely. I was praying to God for a second chance.

After being told in hospital that I had a clot in my heart and had suffered heart failure, I felt very isolated. My heart consultant explained my enlarged heart was only beating 35% of my blood around my body. He said it would be a lifelong illness. I felt I was in the eye of a storm and I understood very clearly that only God's intervention would get me through. This was the first of many, really frightening episodes.

One particular evening, once home, I was really weak, sick, not knowing how long I had to live, and I felt true fear. I felt frozen, like darkness was surrounding me. I was petrified. I thought what should I do? So I prayed. Just a few words over and over again, "I belong to Jesus Christ, I belong to Jesus, I belong to Jesus!"

I have had many incidences of God answering prayer - prayer became vital. Sometimes a prayer in my mind, sometimes angry, tear-filled prayers, not understanding what was going on. Would I see my children grow up? Would I be able to live a closer life with God in thankfulness of Him seeing me through this ordeal? There were times when I wondered if I would live to see the next day. But other times, I felt that I could feel God's peace when praying. From my first A&E admittance in February to my diagnosis this October, God guided me with images brought about in prayer. Once when praying, God showed me a picture of a friend with cancer with Satan claiming his work, then God appeared in pure brilliant light and blew apart Satan and the image - God showing me He was in control of Absolutely Everythine!

In mid-October, I revisited my heart consultant for the results of an ECG. He pointed to his computer screen - "Read that!" he said with a huge smile on his face. It said my heart was now beating normally, the clot had flushed through and the heart was no longer enlarged! I later understood why he was so amazed, enlarged hearts have never been known to reduce back to size! He went on to say he had never seen this before, and my case was being shown to other heart consultants and students. He said I was an 'enigma'! No, I thought, this is the work of my Living God. He is faithful and will never let us go! God used this situation to speak to my consultant, to show him, a man of science, that there is a living God, who we cannot limit to anything!

Because of what God got me through, I no longer fear anything, I know my God is 100% totally in control. Hand everything over to God in prayer! Amen!

We also have a range of books and other items available for free to bless our customers. Just ask if you would like to see any.


We currently have a vacancy for a chef to work every other Monday and Wednesday. If you are interested please contact me.
