Summary of the Annual General Meeting of Bethel Christian Fellowship, held 14th May, 2017.

Pastor's report

Gordon Crick expressed his thanks and appreciation to the many people in the Fellowship who are involved in a wide range of our activities.

He then spoke about his plans to hand over leadership at Bethel. When he started leading the Fellowship in 2010. he had a distinct sense of a purpose and finish point for his ministry (Col 4:17) and he now believes that the mission God has given him is to "take the leadership at Bethel and hand it over to a younger generation" and that the point had now come to start talking openly about this. Chris Taylor has sensed a call into leadership, and is following this up with training to become an Assemblies of God accredited minister, thus Gordon believed the right date for him to step down was September 2018, allowing time for the Fellowship and leadership team to plan and prepare.

Gordon moved on to talk about our home groups which from September this year will be revamped. Gordon concluded by saying that he was looking for growth in this year - in our numbers, our giving and in our love.

Elder Reports

(a) Chris Taylor shared how he was confident that it was in God's will for him to succeed Gordon in the position of Senior Elder. Chris also spoke about home groups and how he felt that the groups were very important in the process of discipling individuals in their faith.



(b) David Cameron expressed his thanks for the support his family had received during a difficult year, and also for the support within the Fellowship for those attending NewDay. He felt that the confidence gained participating in home groups could lead to a greater contribution into the main meetings of the Fellowship.

Financial Report



Putting Jesus First



We make decisions all the time. Most are quite small, some are quite big. The more interested we are in the outcomes, the more we research and try to be best informed. And yet we are strangely human about this. For example, Liz and I recently invested in a new washing machine. I left this to Liz and she made a decision in nano seconds, based on her instincts and the price. On the other hand, we talk endlessly about the pros and cons of buying a new car, try to look at costs, reliability and so on. And then, after all the research and talking, I decide we should keep the old one.

The decisions we make are so influenced by who we are, what we have experienced in the past, and what our values are. Our values are shaped by how we look at the world, and how we perceive our place in the world. We may get recognition through having a responsible job, we may be a single mum with three part time jobs, trying to make ends meet. The decisions we make show clearly what we value and what is most important to us.

According to the Mirror newspaper, 96% of British people believe that strong family values prepare children for a happy life. Interestingly too, an article in the Telegraph in June this year pointed out the gap between the number of people marrying rather than divorcing is now wider than at any time

since 1992. Numbers of marriages are increasing, divorces are falling. These facts can be seen as being encouraging for Christians, but on the other hand there is the fact that more couples are co-habiting without getting married than ever before.

Life is complicated! I need some help. I ask myself, what is the value in the Value? The Bible is a source of truth. At the root of the Christian's value system is a radical statement from Jesus: Seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you. (Matt 6:33)

Many Christians are very practical about everyday decisions, "It really is not necessary to pray about these." But anybody who has lived on the edge knows, small things become big things, and God does answer prayer and help us when we seek him first.

As you put Jesus, his will and his work first in your daily life, you will begin to fully experience God's love and care, for he has promised to provide all your daily needs. Do not spend too much time agonising over the evidence, have faith, step out.

Make the decision to put Jesus first.

The Story of The Well

The Well opened in October 2008 as a result of a vision that Liz Crick had for Bethel to have a 'shop to the world' with a bay window, with the then pastor of the church, Tim Bedward Jones, looking out.

Paul Brooks (who still works there today) suggested the name of The Well. The meaning was twofold: a traditional place where men and women would meet to draw water and have fellowship, and after a café by Victoria coach station where travellers from all over the world would join for refreshment and then pray upstairs (which Paul and his wife had frequented many times in the past).

The Well was always intended to be a place of peace and spiritual refreshment for the people of Witham more than a business. Originally the shop was filled with Christian books and cds that could be borrowed on a sale or return basis, although in practice this proved difficult to manage.

The Well is Bethel Christian Fellowship's town centre presence, and our official church office is also situated here. It is also the mid-week hub for other church activities such as prayer meetings, alpha groups, musical evenings and Christian book launches.

We hope we have built a reputation not only for good food and coffee, but also a place to find spiritual peace, receive encouragement, be listened to, or to just relax and 'be'. Free bibles are available to anyone who wants one, and we do have a small selection of books we can lend.

Jenny Wijekoon is our award winning, fully trained pastoral care volunteer. Jenny uses the Well as a base and offers care in whatever form is needed: spiritual, physical, practical or emotional. Most of her work involves just being there to listen, both to church and nonchurch members, and this might mean at the Well or by home visits if more appropriate. Jenny is experienced at signposting those in need to relevant agencies, such as housing, CAB, counselling and the food bank if needed.

Jenny can be found at The Well on Wednesdays, no appointment necessary, just pop in.

We are open 10am-2pm, Monday-Saturday



Our volunteers are a mixture of faithful and friendly Bethel Christian Fellowship church attendees.

We also have one volunteer per shift who may be recovering from mental health issues, has learning disabilities, may need language support or have other health issues.

At the last Church Council meeting it was decided to review our 'Café Church' to see if the original aims were being met and to respond to some practical issues.

The two original aims were (a) to develop 'fellowship' and (b) to provide a less formal service that would be attractive to non-Christians.

The present format has gone down well with most people and the current table -top provision for children means that children's workers get a one-in-four week break, which has been much appreciated. Visitors have impressed with the friendly atmosphere and the lovely croissants, toast and pastries, cheerfully provided and served by a wonderful team of The aim of developing helpers. fellowship seems well served.

Some reservations have been expressed about the suitability of the café format for worship, and speakers have sometimes struggled to keep to the shorter time frame and the type of talk suitable for non-christian visitors. The content has been too similar to our normal service, it has been suggested.

Achieving a good clear sound system

has also been difficult in the unusually high-ceilinged café area and the (literally) heavy burden of moving all the PA and musical equipment down to the café and back up again afterwards takes a lot of effort.

A new format has been proposed which tries to focus on the second aim and to alleviate the set up issues. Congregational worship gives way to the performance of spiritual songs by a much smaller musical group. Ten minute talks on topics of wider interest, testimonies and book reviews make up a more visitor-orientated programme, to which church members could feel confident inviting non-Christian family and friends. It was agreed to alternate this new format with the existing one for a few months before deciding on its future.

At our recent AGM Gordon identified the vision for BCF going forward as GROWTH. It is our prayer that being willing to try new approaches to 'doing church' will encourage us all to invite others to our monthly café church - a real contribution to our evangelistic ministry.



They are good people, but they don't know me or any of us very well, and when I took the leading role on, I didn't envisage having to be a spokesperson so publicly and so quickly. Especially in matters of finance. Anyone who knows me well knows that my strength lies with words and not numbers! Maths is my Achilles heel!

The meeting loomed and it became obvious that I was going to have to do most of the talking. Even the treasurer couldn't be there as his children were unwell that night. I had asked two experienced past committee members to attend but neither of them could make it either.

It felt like I had been entered for an exam nowithout my permission which I had no

expertise in!!

Prayer being my only back-up, I contacted a few trusted people and asked them to pray hard that all would be well, my words would be well received and the atmosphere better than the meeting before which had been a little tense.

Right from when we entered the building, the atmosphere was better than before. We were in a more relaxed room, with refreshments (where there had been none before) and a greater number of people representing the landlords, several of whom very quickly put me at ease. Without going into details. I want to thank God that the conversation went well and was openly and honestly received. If I'd had to rely on my own strength that evening I would have buckled under the pressure. It felt intense. But only God can go before us and prepare hearts, and knowing that several Godly people were praying made so much difference.

Often the battles we face are psychological, not physical. Thank God that he sees where we are and loves to provide for his children. I am so grateful.


